ISCHE Education & Pandemics Archive Workshop: Hands-on Digital Storytelling

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After two successful workshops on the silences of COVID-19 web archives and digital source criticism, the ISCHE Education & Pandemics Archive Team has decided to offer a further edition of its training programme. This year's workshop at ISCHE Natal in Brazil will encourage participation in hands-on digital history. We are inviting colleagues to create and submit small video clips (e.g. through Adobe applications) using digital sources from our archive that should be meaningfully compared or contrasted with additional materials from another source or digital collection.

We want the videos to address the possible histories of the COVID-19 crisis and the different ways we may look back on it, and how this may be inspired by digital technologies – their specific material quality and ways of interacting with humans. Our idea is to reflect on multiple temporalities and the effects of digital technologies: (1) how technologies shape memories; (2) how distant and more recent pasts interact with each other and with the present and the future; (3) how we could create other histories by comparing silenced or forgotten sources on grievances, ruptures and loss with materials that have been produced or even normalised via editorial processes; (4) and how the history of education can help us to reflect on the consequences of disruptive pasts and our present responsibilities in view of "the long now" (Brand 1999). In addition, we would like to explore and discuss how digital archives can be used and expanded by bringing together sources and people with different geographical backgrounds.

Our call for participation in the workshop provides five "BOXES", each of which contains three pre-selected items/sources from the ISCHE Education & Pandemics Archive. We would ask participants to select one "BOX" and use its contents to create a video clip, adding more materials themselves. During the workshop, participants will be expected to show their videos and critically reflect on the process of digital storytelling and the different layers of history that come into play.

The workshop is limited to twelve participants. Those who are interested in participating are expected to take a proactive approach and send their videos to <u>karin.priem@uni.lu</u> and <u>rafaelarabelo@alumni.usp.br</u> by 15 May 2024 at the latest. We will accept videos in any of the ISCHE languages. Please let us know if you would prefer an in-person workshop in Natal on 18 August 2024 or an online workshop as part of the ISCHE online conference. Videos should not be longer than ten minutes and they may be the result of a collaborative process. There are plenty of free online tutorials on how to make a video that are also aimed at

beginners, but please do feel free to email us if you need help. We would be happy to provide links to tutorials if needed. If there are more than twelve submissions, we will start a selection process based on how convincingly the central issues of the workshop have been taken into consideration. Those who register for the workshop agree that copies of their videos will be uploaded to the ISCHE Education & Pandemics Archive for public use.

Cell Phone Signal only at the Top of the Hill: The Challenges of Distance Education in Minas Gerais / Sinal de Celular Só no Alto do Morro: Os Desafios da Educação a Distância em Minas Digital Education in Uruguay, a Decision prior to the Pandemic/ La Educación Digital en Uruguay, una Decisión previa a la Pandemia	The Minas Gerais state government made content available on digital channels for the public education system. However, not everyone can access it, like Istefani, who lives in the Aranãs stream. She is in the 9th grade and needs to climb up to the top of the hill to be able to study in the middle of the pasture, where she gets a cell phone signal. On the outskirts of Belo Horizonte, it is the same situation. Students do not have electronic devices, and those who do cannot get an internet signal. Teachers and students are _incommunicado_, many families claim they need to choose between feeding the family or having the internet, and the state claims that students will not be harmed since they have printed material and will have revision classes when they return to face-to-face classes. The video focuses on how Uruguay's implementation of a digital educational system years ago helped during the Covid-19 pandemics. It argues the country has not felt a break in the educational process due to the confinements, unlike other countries.
Deepening Social Inequality amid COVID-19	This item, presented in the form of a cartoon, very well depicts the deepening social inequality in Indian Society owing to the COVID-19 pandemic. The education of children belonging to upper socio-economic strata continues unhindered through online mode within the safe boundaries of their home. On the other hand, for children from socio-economic disadvantaged families (who cannot afford computers and smartphones) education is replaced by work. Ironically, the concept of "homework", which was en vogue during pre-pandemic times, is split into "home" for well-off children and "work" for the marginalized, underprivileged children during the pandemic.
